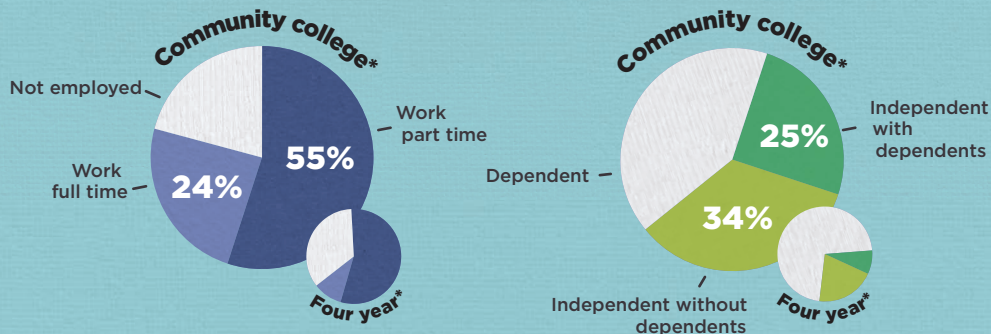


COMMUNITY COLLEGE STUDENTS AND INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

WORK AND FAMILY

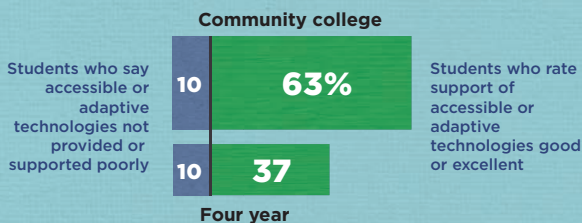
Community college students are more likely than their peers at other types of institutions to be **independent with dependents**, be **married** or in a **domestic partnership**, have **jobs**, and be eligible for **Pell Grants**.

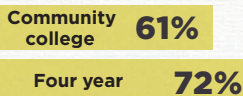
ACCESSIBILITY

Of the 8% of community college students who identified as having a physical disability, a learning disability, or both, the majority are satisfied with their institution's **awareness** and **support** of their needs.



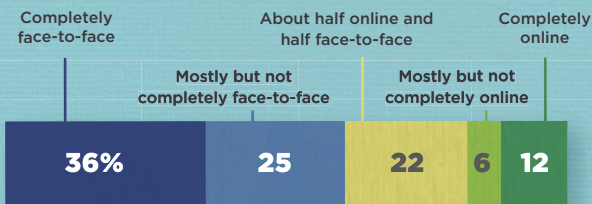
STUDENT SUCCESS TOOLS

Community college students report less awareness of degree planning tools at their institution.



At community colleges, significantly more students of color than white students rated tools such as **early-alert systems**, tools that offer **guidance about courses to take in the future**, and tools that suggest **how to improve course performance** as very or extremely useful.

LEARNING ENVIRONMENT PREFERENCES



While a majority of community college students prefer some form of **blended learning** environment, those who work, are married, are in a domestic partnership, and are female are all more likely to prefer learning environments that are **mostly or completely online**. These preferences are likely due to the demands of balancing work, family, and academics.
